# **Adopted Design Corridors**

To preserve the aesthestic integrity of an area by imposing criteria for the appearance and design of buildings within the corridor. In 1997, twelve design corridors were proposed to improve design and beautify the city; the list has since been expanded to fourteen. Four have been adopted.

## **Proposed Design Corridors**

Design corridors that still need implementation. Some of the proposed corridors are dilapidated, and there are no aesthetic qualities to maintain. In these corridors, it is hoped that attractive,

preserve the "open urban forest landscaped feel" of a boulevard along University Avenue; to protect some of the wild, natural, beauty of the area by imposing a design process that requires identification of key natural features, encourages preservation or improvement of the urban forest, provides wooded pathways, provides a small urban park atmosphere, and incorporates these features into project plan designs; to protect important views, vistas, and significant natural amenities; to lessen street congestion.
